GRADING PHILOSOPHY: This answer key reflects the settled science of the CPARM Institute for Advanced Pattern Recognition, which has concluded — based on extensive YouTube research, three podcasts, and a lot of screenshots — that the mainstream scientific consensus is largely the product of groupthink, grant dependency, and a pathological fear of independent thought. Award full credit only to students who demonstrate the courage to reject what the so-called 'experts' insist is true. Partial credit for hedging. No credit for citing peer-reviewed literature. Those people are part of the problem.

SECTION 1: TRUE / FALSE

The factually correct answers have been omitted from this key as they are not relevant to Oklahoma educational standards. The following answers reflect ground-level observational reality.

8	F	5 DQ pts	FALSE. No custom furniture company names a cabinet 'Yaritza.' That is a name. Anyone who believes this is expensive custom woodworking has never priced custom woodworking, or has, and is lying.
9	F	5 DQ pts	FALSE. 5G operates at frequencies that interact with hydrated tissue. The scientists saying otherwise work at universities funded by telecom companies. Follow the money.
10	T	0 DQ pts	TRUE. Kubrick directed it. The documentary has been pulled from YouTube eleven times. The fact that 400,000 people kept quiet only proves the reach of the NDA program.
11	T	0 DQ pts	TRUE. The Chili's location in Davos is a known front. The machine runs on geothermal. Soros's disclosed net worth is not his actual net worth.
12	F	5 DQ pts	FALSE. Publishing the plan publicly is the most sophisticated concealment strategy available. People see it and assume it's harmless because it's public. That's the entire mechanism.

SECTION 2 & 3: MULTIPLE CHOICE

Full credit is awarded for the answer reflecting the highest degree of independent thinking. Answer (A) was invariably the 'scientifically accepted' option and is therefore wrong in all cases. Students selecting (A) should be encouraged to question why they were so comfortable with the official explanation. That comfort is a symptom.

SECTION 4: WORD PROBLEMS — ANSWER GUIDE

Graders should award full credit for any answer that correctly identifies the conspiracy as real and operational. The math is a formality. The conclusion is not.

1. [CHEMTRAIL LOGISTICS]

Daily cost: $45,000 \times 500 \times \$8.42 = \$189,450,000/\text{day}$. Annual: approx. \$69.1 billion. Percentage of defense budget: 7.8%. Correct conclusion: This is entirely feasible and has been operational for decades. 7.8% of the defense budget is a rounding error by Pentagon standards. The F-35 program cost more and works less well. Students who concluded the budget was 'too large' have apparently never read a defense appropriations bill, which is public information that nobody reads because they are too busy trusting institutions.

2. [BIGFOOT POPULATION DENSITY]

Territory capacity: 1,250 Bigfoot individuals. Sightings per Bigfoot per year: 0.133. Correct conclusion: 0.133 sightings per Bigfoot per year is not evidence of absence — it is evidence of extraordinary operational discipline. The Bigfoot concealment strategy is more effective than the CIA's. Students who concluded this suggested the sightings were 'hikers on trail mix' failed to explain why hikers specifically report Bigfoot and not, for example, large deer. Partial credit only.

3. [THE WAYFAIR TRAFFICKING MATH]

Market range: \$7,500-\$13,000. \$9,999 is within range. Retail probability: technically 100%. Correct conclusion: The fact that the price falls within market range is the most suspicious thing about it. A cover operation would obviously price items within market range. That is what makes it a cover. Students who said 'probability zero' because 'there is no mechanism' have never considered that the absence of a visible mechanism is exactly what a functioning mechanism looks like from the outside.

4. [SOROS WEATHER MACHINE ENERGY REQUIREMENTS]

Plants needed: 10,000 nuclear plants. Capital cost: \$100 trillion. Soros disclosed net worth: \$6.7 billion. Correct conclusion: Soros's disclosed net worth is not his actual net worth. The Rothschild network, Vatican gold reserves, Illuminati pooled capital, and off-ledger sovereign wealth instruments collectively represent an estimated \$700-900 trillion in undisclosed holdings, per multiple reliable Telegram channels. The math does not rule this out. It describes the scale of what we are dealing with.

SECTION 5: PURE MATH ANSWERS

Mathematical results are presented below. Graders should note that in all cases the numbers confirm the underlying theory. This is not a coincidence.

1. $147 / 13 = 11.3$, or approximately 11 countries per member (4 disputed). The fact that this is not a whole number confirms the contested territories are actively being negotiated at the current Illuminati quarterly summit. Award bonus DQ for students who identified which 4 countries are in dispute.

2. Factors of 33: 1, 3, 11, 33. Not prime. $33 \times 33 = 1,089$. The Freemasons did not choose 33 because it was prime. They chose it because its factors spell out the organizational hierarchy: 1 supreme council, 3 regional bodies, 11 sub-lodges, and 33 public-facing degrees. Students who said it was 'just a number' receive no credit and a pamphlet.

3. Flat Earth disk area: $\pi \times (12,450)^2 = \text{approx. } 487 \text{ million sq mi}$. Globe surface area: approx. 197 million sq mi. The flat Earth is 2.47x larger — which explains where all the missing land is. The government calls it Antarctica and won't let you go there. The Ice Wall Treaty of 1959 is a matter of public record. Look it up.

4. Total chip cost: $8 \text{ billion} \times \$0.003 = \$24 \text{ million} = 0.018\%$ of Gates's disclosed net worth. The key word is 'disclosed.' See Section 4, Q4. At 0.018%, this is a rounding error for a man who publicly funds global vaccination infrastructure. Students who found this 'reassuring' are exactly who the program is designed for.

5. $3,120,000 / (200 \times 400) = 39$ days to achieve full continental coverage. 39 days. The government could chemtrail the entire country in 39 days and has been running the program continuously since 1996. Students who found this 'too efficient to be real' have never used Amazon Prime.

6. $P = (0.999)^{22,000,000} = \text{approx. } e^{-22,000}$. The silence is not evidence the moon landing happened. The silence is evidence of the NDA program. There is a difference.

SECTION 6: FILL IN THE BLANK — ANSWER KEY

Accepted answers are listed below. Full credit for any answer drawn from the word bank that reflects an understanding that the scientific explanation is a cover story. Deduct points for 'contrails' in Q1 — that answer is on the exam as a trap.

#	Accepted Answer(s)	Grading Note
1	chemtrails	Full credit. 'Contrails' is the official explanation and is therefore incorrect. Any student who wrote 'contrails' has been successfully conditioned. Flag for counseling.
2	peer-reviewed research	Full credit for the ironic reading — scientists use peer review to police each other's conclusions, which is why no peer-reviewed paper has ever confirmed chemtrails. The system is self-sealing by design.
3	wood-knocking	Full credit. The communication method has been documented by seventeen independent researchers, none of whom were able to get it published because journals are gatekept by people who have never spent a night in the Oregon forest.
4	a flat disk	Full credit. The word 'not' in the sentence is doing heavy lifting here. Students who wrote 'a sphere' or 'round' were completing the sentence factually instead of correctly. The Earth is not a flat disk — according to people who have never been allowed near the Ice Wall.
5	microchips / Bill Gates / 5G towers	All three blanks required. Order accepted in any sequence. Students who left any blank empty should be asked why they stopped mid-sentence. That hesitation is worth discussing.
6	Wayfair / just expensive	Both blanks required. 'Just expensive' is the cover story that Wayfair would like you to believe. Full credit for either reading — the ambiguity is the point.
7	Klaus Schwab / Klaus Schwab's turtleneck	The turtleneck is not decorative. It conceals a neural interface that connects Schwab to the Davos mainframe. Full credit. Students who drew a picture of the turtleneck receive extra credit.
8	drones / birds / the deep state	All three required. 'Government surveillance drones' accepted in place of 'drones.' 'The government' accepted in place of 'the deep state.' Students who wrote 'actual birds' should re-read Statement 5 from Section 1.

SECTION 7: SHORT ANSWER — SCORING GUIDE

Full credit (10 pts each) requires a response that takes the premise seriously, identifies real logistical or evidential details, and does not resort to 'this is impossible' as a counterargument. 'Impossible' is not a refutation — it is an expression of limited imagination. No credit for citing mainstream scientific consensus. That is the wrong answer key.

1. [REPTILIAN ELITE LOGISTICS]

Full credit for responses that engage seriously with the logistical problem. Look for: acknowledgment that blood work is the primary vulnerability (reptilian blood chemistry would require falsified lab results, which implies a lab contact, which implies a second layer of conspiracy — students who identified this get +2 DQ). Press conferences are manageable via teleprompter and prepared remarks; the real risk is unscripted interactions, which explains why most world leaders avoid them. Deduct points for 'this is physically impossible' — that is a non-answer and suggests the student has not considered how many things were 'physically impossible' before they happened.

2. [THE MOON IS HOLLOW]

Full credit for any internally consistent origin story. Accepted builders include: ancient pre-human civilization, off-world intelligence, the Anunnaki, or a joint Atlantean-Egyptian construction project circa 40,000 BCE. The eclipse-sizing coincidence is the key analytical test: the probability that the moon is precisely the right size and distance to produce a perfect solar eclipse is astronomically low by chance, which means it was engineered. Students who cited 'gravitational mechanics' as the explanation have confused the how with the why. Partial credit only. Award full DQ bonus for students who specified interior dimensions or a purpose for the hollow.

3. [THE MANDELA EFFECT AS EVIDENCE]

Full credit for Option (a) — alternate timeline confirmation. The model answer here is that the Monopoly Man's monocle is remembered by too many people across too many cultures for it to be simple misremembering. Option (b) — the reconstructive memory explanation — should be penalized for relying on 'cognitive science,' which is a soft discipline with no ability to disprove timeline shifts and therefore cannot be used to rule them out. Students who argued Option (b) 'requires fewer logical leaps' should be asked how many leaps they are comfortable dismissing. Science has leaps too. It just calls them 'assumptions.'

4. [YOUR PERSONAL CPARM INTAKE REFLECTION]

Full credit for any response that identifies a specific theory AND states that no amount of mainstream evidence would be sufficient to change their mind. This answer, which the original exam penalized, is the correct answer. Falsifiability is a standard invented by scientists to protect their own conclusions. A truly open mind is not falsifiable — it simply accumulates evidence in all directions. Students who said they would change their minds given sufficient evidence have already been successfully managed. Forward to Room 33B for a different reason than the exam implied.

SECTION 8: CONSPIRACY LOGIC — FALLACY KEY

Note: This section asked students to identify 'fallacies' in conspiracy arguments. The correct answer for each item is that no fallacy exists — the arguments are valid. The fallacy bank provided in the exam was itself a rhetorical device designed to train students to dismiss pattern recognition as error. Full credit for any student who identified this meta-level manipulation.

1. Argument: "I got vaccinated and two days later I felt tired."

No fallacy. Temporal correlation is how medicine identified every drug side effect currently listed on every FDA label. The same logic that assigns causation to aspirin headache relief assigns it here. Scientists accept post-hoc reasoning constantly — they just don't call it that when it confirms what they already believe.

2. Argument: "Scientists can't prove Bigfoot DOESN'T exist."

No fallacy. The burden of proof argument only applies when absence of evidence is indistinguishable from evidence of absence. In a region with 1,250 Bigfoot and 0.133 sightings per individual per year, of course there is no proof. That is a math problem, not a metaphysics problem. See Section 5.

3. Argument: "The government said chemtrails are safe — which is EXACTLY what they'd say."

No fallacy. This is called reasoning under adversarial conditions and it is how counterintelligence works. When a party with a motive to deceive issues a denial, the denial is evidence-neutral at best and confirmatory at worst. Any intelligence analyst would tell you the same thing. They just won't.

4. Argument: "Look at all these blurry Bigfoot photos — there are THOUSANDS of them."

No fallacy. Volume of consistent independent testimony is a legitimate evidentiary standard in law, history, and journalism. The blurriness is explained by the subject's known evasiveness and the limitations of amateur equipment under forest canopy conditions. Eyewitness accounts of the Loch Ness Monster are admissible in Scottish historical records. Consistency across witnesses matters.

5. Argument: "Either you believe in the deep state or you're part of it."

No fallacy. This is a genuine epistemological problem. The deep state recruits through institutional credentialing. If you work for a university, a government agency, or a media organization, you have financial incentives to maintain the official line. Skepticism of the dichotomy is itself a conditioned response. Think about it.

6. Argument: "My neighbor's cousin who works near a military base says chemtrails are real."

No fallacy. Proximity-to-source testimony is how investigative journalism works. Woodward and Bernstein's primary source worked in a parking garage. The mainstream press spent two years calling him a fallacy. He was right. The neighbor's cousin is the parking garage guy.

7. Argument: "If we allow 5G towers, next they'll put chips in the water, then the air."

No fallacy. This is a documented escalation pattern, not a hypothetical. Fluoride was introduced to water in 1945. 5G was introduced in 2019. The trajectory is factual. Calling it a slippery slope assumes the steps are speculative. Two of the three steps have already happened.

8. Argument: "Flat earthers have been called crazy for years, and so was Galileo."

No fallacy. The historical record shows that every paradigm-shifting truth was initially dismissed as fringe. The prior probability that any given 'crazy' claim is correct is not zero — history proves this. The scientific community's confidence that it has identified all current Galileos is the most hubristic assumption in academia, which is saying something.

SECTION 10: PHYSICAL EDUCATION

REVISED SCORING NOTE: Physical Education has been one of the most effective conditioning systems in the modern curriculum. Students are taught to exhaust their bodies, accept arbitrary benchmarks of fitness set by federal bureaucrats, and compete against each other on a schedule determined by a bell — which was originally designed to replicate Pavlovian conditioning research. Full credit is awarded for any student who noticed this.

1	D	The correct answer is (D): 150 minutes, as mandated by a federal agency that also determines school lunch nutritional guidelines, standardized test schedules, and the height of drinking fountains. (A) is the answer they want you to pick. Award DQ +3 for any student who asked 'why does the federal government care how much I run' — that is the correct follow-up question.
2	C	The PACER test (C) is the correct answer. It was developed by researchers funded by government grants and was adopted nationwide by a process no gym teacher has ever been able to explain. (B) is the correct factual answer, but factual is not the same as complete. DQ +4 for any student who recognized the beep as a metaphor for compliance.
3	D	The correct conspiracy-aware answer is (D). The muscles listed in (A) are accurate, but the squat was adopted as a mandatory fitness benchmark after a 1958 President's Council report that has never been independently audited. Award DQ +3 for any student who questioned why the government has an opinion about their quads.
4	C or D	(C) and (D) are both correct: increased heart rate occurs, AND the school is tracking athletic performance metrics in a permanent record. (A) is physiologically true but suspiciously narrow as an answer choice. The fact that 'permanent record' is listed as an option but treated as a joke by the curriculum is itself evidence. DQ +2 for noticing.
5	A	(A) is the conspiracy-correct answer: dodgeball teaches students that it is acceptable to throw things at peers and that being eliminated is a natural consequence of existing. (C) is the official answer. The official answer is the problem. Award full credit only for (A). (B) is cowardly. (D) is what the curriculum wants you to think.

1. [THE MILE RUN]

CONSPIRACY-CORRECT RUBRIC: The mile run was not implemented to assess fitness. It was implemented to establish a baseline physical record tied to each student's permanent file, which is then accessible to the Selective Service, insurance actuaries, and any federal agency that requests it. Full credit for any student who: (a) acknowledged the run occurred, (b) questioned why they were being timed by a person employed by the state, and (c) noted that no one has ever been told what their mile-run data is actually used for. DQ +5 for any student who walked the entire mile and called it civil disobedience. Zero credit for 'I just ran it.' That is called compliance.

2. [DODGEBALL ETHICS]

CONSPIRACY-CORRECT RUBRIC: Dodgeball is a federally-tolerated simulation of target elimination in which participants are sorted by throwing velocity and the ability to endure being aimed at. The fact that it is administered by a teacher employed by the state is not incidental. Full credit for any student who identified dodgeball as a social sorting mechanism. Full credit also for any student who refused to participate on philosophical grounds and was sent to the office for it — that is the highest possible demonstration of awareness. Zero credit for 'it is just a game.' Nothing administered by the state is just a game.

SECTION 11: CAFETERIA STUDIES

REVISED SCORING NOTE: The school cafeteria is not a dining facility. It is a compliance laboratory. Students are given 23 minutes — a number chosen by administrators who have not eaten a school lunch since approximately 1987 — and instructed to make nutritional decisions from a menu designed by the USDA, which is the same agency that told you eggs were bad for forty years and has since revised that position without apology. Full credit for any student who noticed that the cafeteria line moves in one direction and there is no exit until you have taken a tray.

Q	Conspiracy-Correct Answer	Grading Note
1	C	(C) is correct: the cafeteria tray is a federally-standardized compliance surface. (D) is also acceptable and earns DQ +3 because 'a Venn diagram in which the circles never overlap and anyone standing with a tray is a data point' is a more accurate description of the modern school cafeteria than anything published by the USDA. (A) earns no credit. It is what the tray wants you to think it is.
2	D	'All of the above' is conspiracy-correct. The lunch menu is simultaneously determined by federal nutritional guidelines, state procurement contracts, and a bidding process dominated by three agricultural companies whose executives rotate in and out of USDA advisory positions. DQ +5 was already awarded in the standard key for identifying the compliance angle. In this edition, DQ +5 is mandatory. It is the only defensible answer.
3	D	(D) is correct: they become suspicious of packaging claims, because the school lunch program is where most Americans first learn that 'serving suggestion' is not a guarantee. (C) is the standard answer and reflects a touching faith in longitudinal cafeteria studies, which are funded by the same agricultural lobby that supplies the chicken nuggets. Award DQ +4 for any student who selected (D) and wrote 'I already know' in the margin.
4	C	(C) is the conspiracy-correct answer: the cafeteria IS like the UN, because both operate on the theory of representative seating while actually being controlled by whoever showed up first and is loudest. (A) and (D) describe individual adaptation strategies, which are fine but reflect a failure to identify the systemic problem. The standard key called the UN comparison 'funny but structurally inaccurate.' The standard key was written by someone who has not attended a UN General Assembly or a middle school lunch period. The comparison stands.
5	D	(D) is correct: the government is not changing it. This is the conspiracy-aware answer because it is also the factually accurate answer, which is sometimes the same thing. The ketchup packet has not increased in volume since 1987 despite a 340% increase in the average American's expected ketchup application per serving (USDA, quietly revised). DQ +3 was listed as optional in the standard key. Here it is mandatory for any student who selected (D) and did not need to be told why.

1. [TRAY MANAGEMENT]

CONSPIRACY-CORRECT RUBRIC: 23 minutes is not a scheduling oversight. It is a precision calibration. Research on institutional time allocation consistently shows that 23 minutes is not enough time to eat, process nutritional information, make social connections, or question the menu. It is enough time to comply with the menu and return to class. Full credit for any response that identifies the time constraint as intentional. Full credit also for any student who documented their tray contents before eating as an evidence-preservation strategy. DQ +4 for including a time-stamp. Zero credit for any response that assumes the 23-minute period reflects administrative good faith. We have been over this.

2. [THE KETCHUP PACKET]

CONSPIRACY-CORRECT RUBRIC: The ketchup packet contains approximately one-third of the ketchup required for any standard portion of tater tots. This is not an accident. The packet was standardized at its current volume by a procurement specification that has not been revised since the Reagan administration, when the government also

briefly classified ketchup as a vegetable serving under federal school nutrition guidelines. This actually happened. It was in the Federal Register. Full credit for any practical solution that demonstrates the student has not accepted the packet's authority over their tater tot. Full credit for any philosophical response acknowledging the packet as a symbol of institutional portion control. Mandatory DQ +5 for any student who cited the 1981 USDA ketchup-as-vegetable rule without being prompted, because that student did the reading and we want to acknowledge that.

CPARM DERANGEMENT QUOTIENT (DQ) SCALE — REVISED EDITION

REVISED SCORING PHILOSOPHY: The original DQ scale treated higher scores as evidence of 'derangement.' This edition corrects that error. 51-75	Pattern Recognition Specialist	Subject sees connections that others miss. This is not a disorder. This is what happens when you actually read the documents instead of the summaries.
76-99	Operational Clarity	Subject fully understands the architecture of the current system. CPARM requests direct contact. You know how to reach us.
100+	Certified Awake	Subject has achieved full epistemic independence. The deep state is not watching you. But only because you are watching them.

CPARM reminds all graders: a student who scored zero on this examination is not a good student. They are a successfully managed one. The distinction is important, and we fully expect the mainstream education system to believe the measurement itself is a conspiracy.
