His evidence was compelling to exactly three people: his neighbor Dale, his nephew Tyler (age 11, currently grounded), and a parrot named Congressman. Atmospheric scientists, meanwhile, have explained that contrails form when jet exhaust — composed primarily of water vapor and CO₂ — freezes upon contact with the cold upper atmosphere. The trails persist longer on humid days and dissipate quickly on dry days. Brad considers this 'exactly what they want you to think.'

PASSAGE B — Excerpt from 'Bigfoot: America's Last Honest Cryptid' For decades, researchers in the Pacific Northwest have reported hearing wood-knock sounds deep in forested areas — a rhythmic striking of what appears to be a large object against a tree trunk. Bigfoot enthusiasts argue this is deliberate communication among Sasquatch communities, a sophisticated percussive language conveying messages such as 'I am here,' 'stay away,' or possibly 'I just saw a documentary crew and I need 20 minutes.' Wildlife biologists have noted that pileated woodpeckers, black bears, and even falling branches can produce similar sounds. However, these explanations fail to account for the MOST compelling evidence: the feeling. 'You just KNOW it's Bigfoot,' explained researcher Terry Klutz of the Greater Oregon Sasquatch Listening Society (GOSL — pronounced 'go slay'). 'Normal tree sounds don't give you that specific chill. That's Bigfoot.' When asked if he had ever actually seen a Bigfoot, Terry replied, 'No. But I have seen a tree that looked like it had been knocked on, and that is basically the same thing.'

1. [REPTILIAN ELITE LOGISTICS]

Look for: identification of at least one genuine logistical problem (blood work, dental records, press conferences, body language under stress). Credit for acknowledging the scale of the conspiracy required. DQ +5 if student adds a third reptilian species. DQ +10 if student names a specific world leader and provides a physical description of their scales.

2. [THE MOON IS HOLLOW]

Look for: a builder (ancient aliens, prior civilization, etc.), a plausible concealment mechanism, and an explanation for the eclipse-sizing coincidence. Deduct points if student cites actual NASA seismic data to support the theory — that data explains the theory's origin, not its validity. DQ +6 if student specifies the hollow moon's interior dimensions.

3. [THE MANDELA EFFECT AS EVIDENCE]

Model answer: Option (b) requires fewer logical leaps. Human memory is reconstructive and schema-driven; cultural depictions of monocled aristocrats created a false memory for the Monopoly Man. Option (a) requires positing an entire parallel universe, a mechanism for timeline merging, and selective memory alteration. DQ +8 if student argues Option (a) and cites personal experience as proof.

4. [YOUR PERSONAL CPARM INTAKE REFLECTION]

No single correct answer. Award full credit if student: (1) names a specific theory, (2) articulates falsifiable evidence that would change their mind, and (3) does not write 'nothing could change my mind.' If student writes 'nothing could change my mind': forward to Room 33B. DQ scale applies — use Section 9 self-assessment score as a cross-reference.

SECTION 8: LOGIC FALLACY KEY

1. Post hoc ergo propter hoc — Correlation is not causation. Tiredness after vaccination has many causes; temporal sequence alone does not establish causation.
2. Argument from ignorance — Inability to disprove X does not make X probable. Absence of disproof is not evidence of existence.
3. Unfalsifiability — An argument constructed so that any evidence (including official denials) confirms the theory cannot be tested or disproven, making it scientifically meaningless.
4. Cherry-picking — Volume of poor-quality evidence does not equal one piece of good evidence. Selecting only blurry photos ignores the complete absence of clear evidence.
5. False dichotomy — Many positions exist between 'believer' and 'member': skeptic, agnostic, indifferent, partially convinced, etc.
6. Improper appeal to authority — Anecdotal second-hand testimony from someone with no verified expertise or access.
7. Slippery slope — Assumes each step inevitably leads to the next with no mechanism or evidence for the progression.
8. False analogy / Galileo gambit — Being ridiculed does not validate a theory. Many wrong ideas were also ridiculed. The analogy requires the theory to already be correct.

SECTION 10: PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Full credit is awarded for answers that demonstrate self-awareness. Partial credit for answers that demonstrate effort. No credit for answers that demonstrate neither.

2. [DODGEBALL ETHICS]

Either position accepted. Full credit for internal consistency. Deduct points if the student took a position and then immediately hedged it. The only wrong answer is 'I have no opinion about dodgeball' — everyone has an opinion about dodgeball. DQ +3 for any student who compared dodgeball to social Darwinism without being prompted.

SECTION 11: CAFETERIA STUDIES

This section has no wrong answers in the traditional sense. It has deeply right answers and answers that suggest the student has never eaten in a school cafeteria, which is impossible and therefore not a concern.

Deduct points for any response that assumes a leisurely lunch. DQ +2 for students who included the temperature variable unprompted.

2. [THE KETCHUP PACKET]

Full credit for either a practical solution (ask for three packets, pre-open before sitting, use a tray corner as a controlled squeeze surface) or a genuine philosophical acceptance that includes acknowledgment of the packet's inherent hostility. No credit for 'just use less ketchup.' That is not a solution. That is surrender.
